## **MABA Convention**

As you already know, our club is hosting the Mid-America Bonsai Alliance Convention (MABA) June 23-26. It is rare that a regional bonsai convention is held in Milwaukee, so it is a very exciting time for bonsai enthusiasts.

It is also a fantastic opportunity to learn from five of the most highly regarded bonsai teachers in the country.

**François Jeker** from France is best known for his work on dead wood and is always willing to share his methods and techniques with others. Mr. Jeker is not only a complete bonsai artist, but also a teacher and creator of seven bonsai schools around the world.

**Ted Matson** from California is the curator of the Huntington Bonsai Collection in greater Los Angeles. We are very fortunate to have Mr. Matson at our convention as he maintains a busy schedule and has limited his travel outside of California.

**Todd Schlafer** from Colorado is an avid collector of Yamadori. . He recently won the American Bonsai Society Finest Native North American Species tree at The 5th US National Bonsai Exhibition. Ryan Neil recently said that Todd Schlafer is now considered the most sought after bonsai artist in United States.

**Mark Fields** from Indiana is well regarded artist having several tree displayed at the US Nationals as well as having trees win Best of Show at American Bonsai Society Convention and at Midwest Bonsai Society Professional. Mr. Fields is also a strong believer of giving back to the bonsai community where he is currently the President of the American Bonsai Society

**Jennifer Price** from Illinois has taught workshops and given demonstrations worldwide and recently was in Germany to be a part of Generation Bonsai and on to represent America at an international bonsai convention in Shanghai, China

Each of these outstanding teachers will present one demonstration and at least two workshops. Each workshop is limited to seven or less people each, so that each student can get more time with the teacher. The teachers have been involved with selection of the material used in the workshops, so you KNOW that you will be getting outstanding material.

The Convention features another way to learn more about our favorite art form. The critique is an event where 20 people join one of the headlining artist and take a private tour of the bonsai exhibit. The artist discusses each tree in the exhibit and explains what he, or she, likes about the tree and how the tree could be made better. It is a great way to learn a lot in a short time and at minimal expense.

The only thing that you must do in order to participate in this outstanding event is to register. You can register for the entire convention or you can register for one day only. In order to take full advantage of the opportunity, a full registration is the best bargain. Registrants can watch all of the demonstrations and are granted "silent observer" status for every workshop! So, one full registration permits the registrant to watch and participate in every aspect of the Convention.

There are five raffles during MABA/Milwaukee 2022. Silent Auctions and a Live Auction. Your generous donations and continued support make a world of difference in our Bonsai community. ## The Best of Bonsai Times, and Nearly the Worst of Bonsai Times.

Due to COVID, the date for the Milwaukee Bonsai Society's 50th Annual Exhibit to be held during summer 2020 had come and gone. In November 2020, there was the promise of a vaccine and possible eradication of COVID. As we began to plan for the next annual exhibit, we would need a

bonsai artist and a venue that would be safe or at least safe enough for our members and the public.

Who is the first bonsai artist that we called? It was Mark Fields - someone who knows science and bonsai. He has been studying bonsai since he was nine years old, learning from bonsai artists around the world. I asked him "What do you think about coming to an exhibit in late August 2021?" I don't remember him hesitating. Our minds were on the same track and he agreed.

Then we needed to find a venue. A few months passed and we kept getting a negative response from the people who run the Milwaukee County building where we normally have our meetings and have our annual exhibit. We then contacted The Lynden Sculpture Gardens. We have a great, symbiotic, working relationship with them. They have 40 acres of land on the north side of the county. They have developed a great natural area filled with trees and giant sculptures from many famous artists. The staff helped us a lot with the building of our county's only permanent collection of about 30 bonsai.

We called and talked to Polly, the administrator, and told her what we were looking for. She suggested that we have our exhibit the day after their BBQ night on Thursday August 26th. That way she could give us free use of their two 60x40 foot tents. Who doesn't like free? So, that was the hard part, or so we thought. We normally set up for the exhibit on a Thursday and then on Friday have the bonsai tree set up, judging and a social. Then on Saturday and Sunday we would open up to the public. Now we would have to do the set up at a new outdoor venue and tree collection all on Friday!

Through the spring we had contacted some TV and radio stations trying to get some exposure for our event and promotion for bonsai. We got a nibble from one of the TV stations. But then they didn't answer emails and I thought that we had lost the possible promotion. Two weeks before the event we heard back from the TV station. They wanted to come and videotape the exhibit and do an interview, which sounded great. The reporter asked when would be best to

do the interview? We thought around 3:00-4:00 p.m. on Friday or during our evening social. He said that he needed to be there much earlier at 11:00 a.m. to do the videotaping and then edit it in time for that evening's program. Because the BBQ was the night before, we couldn't set up until Friday morning. We would have just three hours to do the set up. We started to set up at 8:00 a.m. and were done by 11:00 a.m. with tables, signs, backdrops, table cloths, displays of 60 trees, all of the accents, and an educational area. Twenty members chipped in and worked hard to get it done in time. The videotaping went smoothly and that evening's TV program was seen by many people in the Milwaukee area.

Our exhibit was the week before Labor Day. It's normally a time when the weather in Wisconsin is cooling down and gets refreshing. That didn't happen. Both Saturday and Sunday were in the 90's. Saturday night, just before the last

of the volunteers were leaving, a rainstorm and wind came to visit. We had brought some plastic bags to cover the bonsai tables, but the wind blew hard.

On Sunday we got more rain on and off, and we worked to protect things. Between the rain showers, as hardy Wisconsinites do, people came out to see the show.

During the event, we do a public vote for the nicest tree and we took in more than 200 votes. I'm just guessing, but maybe one-half to two-thirds of the people who came voted. So, maybe 300-400 people came to see the exhibit. It was a success!

Through wind, rain, thunder and lightning, the branches of Milwaukee Bonsai Society grew a little tougher and closer together. Our club may have gained an additional jin and a shari from this exhibit. They will add to the beauty of our 50+ years of being a bonsai society.
