SETTING THE FOUNDATION FOR 2023

During most of 2022 the Education Committee (Judy Schmidt, Steve Carini, John Nate, Ron Fortmann) have been busy at work preparing a list of subjects that could be used at meetings to further everyone's education.

It is the committee's hope that the subjects selected will be of interest to all of our members, regardless of your current level of knowledge or experience in the bonsai hobby.

The Executive Board has approved the Education Committee's plan with some minor adjustments and has tasked our committee to continue to map out a multi-year plan to draw from in the future.

The first thing the Education Committee prepared in 2022, was a set of guidelines of what knowledge and skills one should hold when considering what level one would classify oneself, a Novice; Intermediate; or Advanced. That information is currently available on the club's website.

The main change coming in 2023, is there will be a Main topic at each meeting that will use the bulk of the meeting time. There will also be a shorter session (less than an hour) during our meeting time that will be focused on helping newer members build their skills on basic foundational information and techniques, a review of these subjects may also be useful to those with more experience. The choices of subjects were chosen to be presented in months when those techniques or information could be put to immediate practice with your trees at home. There may be workshops or demonstrations scheduled in the weeks or months after the initial presentation to help members solidify these techniques and practices.

During 2022 meetings, the club has been recording those meetings and working on having that digital content available to members, again on the club's website. More information on that as the details are worked out and when and how that content will be able to be accessed.

So to summarize there are a number of members working hard to make the Milwaukee Bonsai Society a club that is fully and completely vested in educating our membership. The actions that will be taken in 2023 are intended to take each of us further in our individual bonsai journey.

I hope each of you are willing to be part of this journey. If you have suggestions or concerns regarding the path taken, please talk to any of the Education Committee or Executive Board members so that

your comments can be reviewed and considered.

MBS Making a Pot for a Forest Class

• Saturday January 14^{th,}, Bryan will teach you the process of making a 15" oval pot. You will be supplied with rolled out clay to make the base of the pot, the walls of the pot and feet. Your pot can be whatever height wall that you want and you can design it how you like. Smooth and simple, organic or anything you can think of. You will be taught a good method for making a large pot, you will be told how to slowly dry the pot, detail the pot and flip it over to put feet on your pot. There will be a very detailed hand out for you describing what you will learn in class and what you will need to do at home to finish up your pot. Your pot can be glazed in earthy tones or in flat green shade. More instructions will be coming.

Overwintering 'tropicals'



The following method has been working out for me for years. First see photo:

The set up was pretty easy to make. 2×4 's and plywood. Plastic sleds, fluorescent lighting, timers and pea gravel.

When the trees first come in I set the timer for 8 hours of light. That continues until January. One hour is added in January. One hour is added each month after that. No fertilizer is used until about March or April. I have never lost a tree using this method.

I am downsizing, so I have sleds, fluorescent lights and timers available - nothing more than \$5 each. If interested, contact Kris <u>hagr8d@mac.com</u>.
